SAFETY SCHOOL

The Snobirds will again be offering snowmobile safety classes this winter. The classes are conducted by qualified instructors, from the Snobirds, who are certified by the State D.N.R.. Satisfactory completion of the class meets the D.N.R. requirements.

"Any person who is at least 12 years old AND who is born on or after January 1, 1985 is required to possess *a valid Snowmobile Safety Certificate* in order to operate a snowmobile on public trails, lands or frozen waters. You must carry the certificate while riding and you must display it to a law enforcement officer when requested."

Enrollment is open to young persons 11 years of age and older. As this training is important to public and personal safety, a parent or guardian is welcome to attend with the son or daughter. There is a \$10 fee for registration and D.N.R. safety materials.

The course consists of three evening classes with subjects of snowmobile laws, ethics, terminology, maintenance, clothing, first aid, environmental and ecology problems.

We have two sets of indoor sessions scheduled this season. Total cost is \$10.00 The first set will be December 7. 14 and 21 at the Menomonee Falls Community Center, W152 N8645 Margaret Rd in Menomonee Falls. The second set of classes will be on January 4, 11 and 18. For reservations call Gary Breuckman at 414-442-4278. Classes run from 6:30 p.m. to 9:30 p.m. each night, and you must attend all three sessions to be certified.

Northern Minnesota Snofari February 19th - 26th, 2006

We will snowmobile on fantastic trails with beautiful scenery and also many places to see and tour. There will be groups of different speeds or bring your own group.

Sunday: Trailer to Grand Rapids, MN (Approx. 475 miles) Stay at Sawmill Inn.

Monday: Tour Itasca State Park, See headwaters (beginning) of the Mississippi River. Stay at Super 8 in Fosston, MN.

Tuesday: Tour Digi-Key Corp., largest distributor of electronic components, lunch at Black Cat Sports Bar and Grill, displaying 40 years of Arctic memorabilia, tour Arctic Cat plant, stay at Best Western, Thief River Falls, MN.

Wednesday: Tour Polaris factory, lunch at Brenigan's, which adjoins the Polaris Experience museum. Stay at Can-Am Motel in Warroad, MN.

Thursday: Marvin Windows are made in Warroad. The city is famous for the manufacturing of ice hockey sticks, especially for the Olympics. Tours available for both factories. Tour Lake of the Woods, which has a city of ice fishing shacks, some very elaborate. Stay at Day's Inn in International Falls, MN.

Friday: Ride to Kettle Falls on the 34-mile Rainy Lake Trail, see the Falls and the famous Kettle Falls Hotel, built 1913. More lake riding to Crane Lake for lunch. All lake trails are well marked and safe. Stay at Fortune Bay Resort and Casino in Tower, MN.

Saturday: Ride back to Grand Rapids viewing the Hull Rust Mahoning Mine (largest open pit mine, 3 miles long, 600 feet deep). Cross Powers Bridge, longest bridge in MN.

Sunday: trailer home.


A great opportunity to try your new sled or see if your old sled is in top condition for the season. We ride during the day, evenings are spent telling stories, making future plans, eating and drinking.

It's been a while since I have written a report for the Track & Trails. It's not been that there has not been things going on, however not a lot of progress was made in the things that were being worked on up until this point.

As you probably know many legislative iniatives are in the system being worked on. The Sound issue is a constant and on going effort in order to protect our trails from being closed by landowners who have problems with load snowmobiles coming close to their homes. The DNR has a different idea of where the sound decibel level should be than the rest of the organized snowmobiling. In the spring AWSC got together with some legislators a started the process of going after our own law to achieve this. The law is still in progress and is now on its way to the Senate floor in Madison to be voted on which if passed would be the final step to becoming a law and solve the problems our landowners are having with loud snowmobiles.

The 55 MPH nighttime speed limit bill is as moving forward and while not everyone is in agreement with this bill, it was one of the things that came as a result of having the second highest fatality total ever last season. Many other solutions were discussed and AWSC along with organized snowmobiling were told that if something done by us, others would do things for us to try to control this continuing growing problem. This bill could become a law as early as later this month and still go into effect for this snow season. I'll keep you informed as this bill continues to move though

the legislature.

Deer Hunt 2006 is a big issue, which appears the DNR will be pursuing very hard. This would establish a 4-day Antler less Deer Hunt 2 weeks after Thanksgiving and could depending on the way the calendar end as late as December 14 in some years. This if allowed, would cause snowmobile trails not to open until mid December due mostly to landowner access issues during hunting seasons. This would mostly affect the northern counties of our state. AWSC has gone on record as to opposing any December deer hunt north of Hwy 8 for that reason. The DNR say that this December hunt would be to control the size of a every expanding deer herd, however AWSC disagrees and state that they would be better off to control the deer population by giving extra FREE deer tags to hunters already in the woods during the regular season held in November. AWSC is committed to fighting this issue to protect our season.

If you would like to catch a good snowmobile program on local television, you should check out a program called "SNOW TRAILS TV" which runs on your Public Broadcasting Station (Channel 36) in the local area on Sunday at 6 PM CST. This a great program about snowmobiling sponsored by the International Snowmobile Association. Check it out!

This pretty much covers what has been happening with your state association (AWSC) over the past months. While everyone will never agree on the decisions made AWSC is dedicated to protect snowmobiling in the future, thus allowing those who follow us to enjoy the sport as much as we do today. THINK SNOW and always remember that:-
