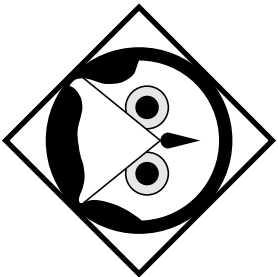
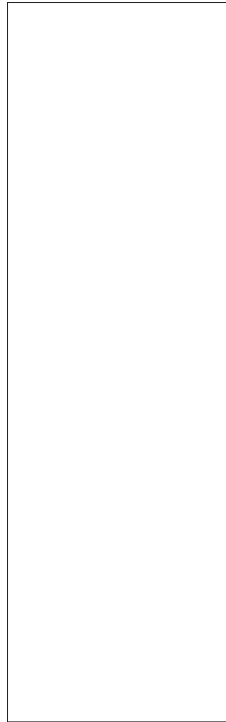

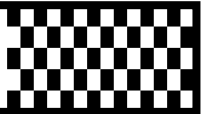

The AWSC held it's annual workshop over the weekend October 31st to November 2nd 2014 at Chula Vista in Wisconsin Dells with 900 people in attendance. Friday was registration day with time to socialize, meet with old and make new friends at hospitality rooms and a dance.

Saturday started out with the general session where we were updated by speaker Ed Klim from the International Snowmobile Manufacturer's Assn. on the state of our sport. Also another speaker Sandy Knapp from American Income Life Insurance brought us up to date on our free death accidental policies provided to all AWSC members.

After lunch we then attended workshops on DNR Safety updates, Questions on proper ways to handle on-line rosters and memberships, Information on the NEW Wisconsin Trail pass, How to prepare DNR grooming worksheets & proper signing of our trails, a session on "is your club ready for new members and the trail pass program" and then one on the new trail pass which goes in to effect next year July 1, 2015. ## Apostle Islands Ice Caves

The first saddlebag snowmobile trip, I ever went on, was in a different century, in the Togwotee Wyoming area. I learned a lot. This past season, I went on a trip with a small group of experienced saddlebaggers and had a lot of fun and challenges. This is about one of the better days that week.

Thursday Feb. 20th 2014, our crew was leaving the Lumbermen's motel in Iron River Wisconsin, in Bayfield county. Our destination was Washburn, not too far as the crow flies, but we can always find a long way to get somewhere. We had been watching on the TV, from before we left home, about the fantastic ice caves, along the bluffs of the mainland, facing Sand island, one of the Apostle Islands. Some research had been done, initially indicating you couldn't get there by snowmobile. As it turns out, all of the bluffs in the area of the ice caves, are in the Federal Apostle Islands National Lakeshore Area, near the town of Cornucopia. Powered vehicles are prohibited on the land, and for a quarter mile away from the shore.

But, those who come by land have to park their cars and walk a minimum of 1 1/2 miles to get to the first cave, and that far back as well. Those who can use a map and compass, and come by snowmobile, can park 1/4 mile from shore and then walk to the first cave on the shoreline. The ice caves were magnificent, formed by runoff from the soil up on top of the bluffs, which drips down, and in really cold weather, not only forms huge icicles, but can completely close in the cliff overhang, by a wall of ice. We had a great time there, were the envy of those on foot who had to walk 6 times as far as we did, and then we quickly left for some food. The only restaurant open in Cornucopia, opened up a room for us to dine in, and we enjoyed a very nice lunch. The owner joined us, he and his wife were recently relocated from the Wisconsin Dells area. They said the previous Saturday was the busiest day they ever had, including Labor Day.

Big winds preceding a Friday blizzard, closed the ice caves to the public and caused great leads (cracks) to open in the ice. The ice caves were officially closed for the season, at sundown the day we left. We were lucky to have seen them, since it is rare to have a winter so cold that the ice walls form.



# SAFETY SCHOOL

The Snobirds will again be offering snowmobile safety classes this winter. The classes are conducted by qualified instructors, from the Snobirds, who are certified by the State D.N.R.. Satisfactory completion of the class meets the D.N.R. requirements.

“Any person who is at least 12 years old AND who is born on or after January 1, 1985 is required to possess *a valid Snowmobile Safety Certificate* in order to operate a snowmobile on public trails, lands or frozen waters. You must carry the certificate while riding and you must display it to a law enforcement officer when requested.”

As this training is important to public and personal safety, a parent or guardian is welcome to attend with their student without paying a fee, unless they also wish to be certified. There is a \$10 fee for registration and D.N.R. safety materials. The course consists of three evening classes with subjects of snowmobile laws, ethics, terminology, maintenance, clothing, first aid, environmental and ecology problems.

We have two sets of indoor sessions scheduled this season. Total cost is \$10.00

The first set will be December 3, 10 and 17 at the Menomonee Falls Community Center, W152 N8645 Margaret Rd in Menomonee Falls.

The second set of classes will be on January 7, 14 and 21.

For reservations call Gary Breuckman at 414-442-4279. Classes run from 6:30 p.m. to 9:30 p.m. each night, and you must attend all three sessions to be certified.

# Trail Work - covering bridges

The Snobirds snowmobile club, had a good turnout of workers for the trail put in on Saturday Nov. 8th. Our normal area of responsibility are the bridges on the Bugline trail. There is a long high one, north of Sussex, and then a shorter bridge over the Fox River, just north of Menomonee Avenue, near Village Bowl.

To protect the expensive diagonal planking used for the deck of these bridges, we put on 4ft. x 8ft. plywood sheets. Since the bridges are nearly 12 ft. wide, this takes a lot of plywood. We carefully install short Phillips head deck screws to hold down the plywood and keep the edges of it, from curling up when they get wet.

This year, it took us about 3 hours to get the job done, starting with removing the plywood from storage and loading it on trucks and trailers. We drive our convoy down the bugline, and then get to work. A lot of screwguns get used, after we used leaf-blowers to blow all the debris off the bridges, to make sure it is not trapped under the plywood.

It is fun to be up on the long bridge, when a train goes roaring thru below us.

This season we had a good-sized crew. The foreman was Ed Pollich. Workers included: Steve Biehl, Bruce Blodgett, Brian Gramoll, Dave Maas, Scott Pinzer, Tom Pollich, Dave Rowley, Pat & De Anne Standlee and Ron Wendt.

Three awards were presented by DNR ATV & Snowmobile Program Administrator Gary Eddy to Snobird instructors at the Safety Class at the Snow Show.



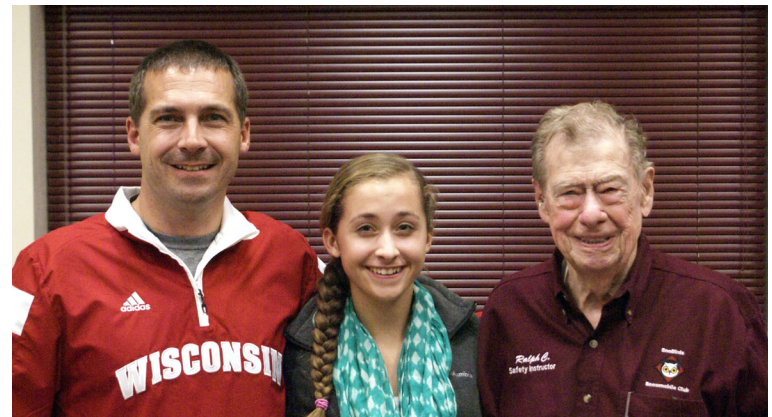
